 Commissioner Backenstow gave special report regarding meeting with Cascade Engineers regarding the tank. See attached report.

#### E. Public Comments:

Resident Tom Kammerer reported that he has reviewed old plans for construction of the big tank and found information that a geotechnical report apparently exists. He suggests that the board should find the old report as it undoubtedly contains valuable information about the site and about the tank design. Having that information could save money now. LR Squire Inc. did the report. Boston couldn't find the company so they may no longer exist. The construction plans show that the tank was designed in 1977 for Seismic Zone 2. At that time, all of Oregon was Seismic Zone 2 and the corresponding seismic design requirements were for a much smaller earthquake than building codes require today. The plans required excavation to a depth of about 8ft below original sloping ground surface, where allowable bearing pressure was 2500 psf. Compacted granular backfill was specified on top of the soil at this depth to level the site under the tank. He has also reviewed the notes from the then-superintendent-at the time the tank was constructed. There was a leak where the floor slab meets the west side by wall. The wall apparently moved a bit and the contractor also did not seal the joint correctly. The contractor had to re-seal the joint seal. Apparently there was a leak higher up in south wall as well. Kammerer thinks the shape of the tank and movement of the wall may have contributed to the cracks that developed later in the corners. Kammerer has also been looking at the EPA websites, to determine if there are funding options for earthquake/disaster mitigation/resilience. Oregon and the federal government have been pushing toward greater seismic resilience in construction. The State and Federal Govt. see advantages in preparing for seismic events as the cost may be less than trying to recover after an event. Recovery would also be faster. Oregon law requires utilities to have a seismic hazard mitigation plan, although ORWD may be exempt from some regulations due to size of the district. Grants for hazard mitigation programs may be available, up to as much as 75% of cost of a project.

Since we cannot qualify for grants thru the USDA, we have two options for funding, both with Business Oregon. One option has a forgivable grant for \$100,000 but with more restrictions. The other option does not have this grant, but has fewer restrictions. Both of these options have the same interest rate.

## F. Special Order of Business

- Boston has a proposed letter of Engagement with Speer Hoyt, and commented that ORWD needs to budget more for legal next year as we prepare to apply for grants/loans. Boston decided to table this until next meeting, to give everyone a chance to read it.
- Community Center Event: There is a request for use of the Community Ctr. Boston checked the bylaws clearly state that the District may not charge admission for an event but can accept donations. The group using the hall also

may not charge admission. Any group using the Community Ctr. must respect the No Alcohol rule which is posted and is stated in the use agreement. Anderson: parking for a big outside group is a concern as well.
